Welcome back to a new term at InMAT. During my visits to schools this term its noticeable that every one has come back with energy and enthusiasm for the year ahead.

While we were enjoying a well earned summer break, there has been lots going on in our schools. We fortunately did not need to respond to the eleventh hour RAAC emergency. However, there have been improvements to many of our school buildings. Most of our schools have had upgrades to their lighting, with LED systems installed. This will not only reduce our energy consumption, but also provides a better ambience and working environment for our pupils and staff. Some other smaller projects took place, such as resurfacing of the driveway at Little Harrowden, new fire prevention measures at Hall Meadow, and an enclosed pathway at Wollaston. Further big projects are planned. Works will soon begin at Kettering Park Juniors to make sure the Victorian building and tower continue to be a striking focal point in the local community.

Last year saw some of the best outcomes in INMAT's history. More of our pupils than ever left our schools well prepared for the next stage of their education. We know that infant and junior education is vital in giving our children the knowledge and skills they need to succeed in life. This includes social, personal and cultural knowledge as well as the academic. We were all very proud of our pupils who moved on last year. We know they will continue to do well in their new schools. This year, pupils will continue to reap the benefits of our renewed curriculum. This includes in phonics where pupils are doing really well learning to read following the Read Write Inc. programme. Parents of children who are new to the early years will become familiar with the rhymes and sayings linked with the programme. And just to remind everyone, 'you can't Fred a red' (ask your children)!

We have already had one Ofsted visit this term. Pupils, staff, parents and the local academy committee at Wollaston Primary School showcased their work when inspectors visited. We are looking forward to sharing the report with you as soon as it is published. At the end of last term Standens Barn and Kingsley Primary School had their inspections. The reports are now available on the school's websites. We are very proud that Ofsted recognised the hard work and dedication of the pupils, staff and wider community at both schools.

This year we are hoping to develop more trust wide projects. The 'INMAT Big Sing' will take place again in the summer term, and we hope with even more pupils taking part. Our schools are working more closely together sharing expertise to make sure we are doing the best we possibly can for our pupils. As I begin my third year at INMAT, I am very proud of the achievements and successes over the last two years. I am really looking forward to seeing how 2023/24 unfolds.

It has been another busy term for all of our children as we come to the end of this academic year. We had a visit from the Life Education Northants, during this all the children thoroughly enjoyed meeting Harold the giraffe and learning all about our bodies, brain and how to stay healthy.



On 27th June we celebrated Music Day. The children dressed up as rockstars and had a day learning about music from different countries which involved listening to music and playing instruments. During the afternoon the children had the opportunity to perform to each other and we ended the day with an assembly. Dev came to play the bass guitar which the children all thoroughly enjoyed.



Year 6 overcame fears, acquired new skills and demonstrated our values of respect, responsibility and resilience as they enjoyed 5 days at Golvilon, Wales. The centre challenged the children through a range of activities including hiking, gorge walking, canoeing, bush craft and walking through a pitch-black tunnel! The children smiled throughout and with their excellent teamwork came home with stories and memories to treasure.



The New Walk Museum, Leicester enabled our Year 3 children to explore Ancient Egypt. They also had a visitor in to teach them more about Hinduism. Both experiences are supporting their learning and the children have used the knowledge they gained to inform their understanding and investigations about these areas.

In celebration of harvest, we had a more visitors including a Reverend/farmer who taught the children about harvest from the farming and Christian world linked to our theme, 'Field to Fork' and participated in some harvest 'live' lessons through engaging with the National Farmers Union primary school lessons.

STANDENS BARN CELEBRATE OFSTED 'GOOD' RATING



During the last week of term in July, we were notified of an Ofsted inspection visit which led to a very busy, eventful, tough, joyous and wonderful end to the year.

When Ofsted have previously judged a school to be good, they will then normally go into the school about once every four years to confirm that the school remains good. Consequently, on the 19th and 20th July 2023, we had the greatest pleasure of sharing many wonderful aspects of school life with the inspector.

During the inspection, the inspector met with myself, subject leaders, staff and representatives of the Trust. She carried out deep dives in early reading; mathematics; and design and technology and for each deep dive, the inspector met with subject leaders, looked at curriculum plans, visited a sample of lessons, spoke to teachers, spoke to some pupils about their learning and looked at samples of pupils' work.

The final Ofsted report has now been released and I am immensely proud and incredibly excited to share it. It is merely a highlight of all the comments and discussions that were held over the 2 days. I had the pleasure of listening to the praise offered by the inspector about what she had observed and heard. The inspector described how our school embodies the values we hold so dear and I could not contain my emotion at the sheer success that has been created by all of those in our school community.

I am so incredibly proud of our team- my colleagues, our community and our children. The report reflects the commitment and dedication from my team of wonderful colleagues who work tirelessly to ensure our children have the BEST opportunities. It is also a reflection of our fabulous pupils who are committed to demonstrating BEST in all aspects of school life.

THE INSPECTOR STATED THAT STANDENS BARN PRIMARY SCHOOL CONTINUES TO BE A GOOD SCHOOL AND HIGHLIGHTED A WHOLE HOST OF STRENGTHS AND QUALITIES. THE REPORT STATES THAT:

'Pupils, and children in the early years, are happy and safe in this caring school. They talk confidently about 'being their BEST' (brave, enthusiastic, safe and thoughtful). They demonstrate these values in their excellent behaviour and the respect they show for each other'

'Leaders, including trustees, have high expectations of the pupils. They strive for excellence in every respect. Teachers are ambitious for pupils and care about their achievements. Trust and school leaders are clear as 'one team' about the standards they expect. They work hard to make the curriculum and lessons interesting. As a result, pupils enjoy their learning and the breadth of subjects they study. They achieve well across the range of subjects. They develop technical language to talk about the knowledge they remember'

'Pupils, including pupils with English as an additional language, quickly become accurate readers. Teachers promptly identify pupils who need more help with their reading. Pupils who have extra support with reading catch up quickly'



SAFEGUARDING SPACE



ONLINE SAFETY

Online safety is as an umbrella term for promoting the safeguarding of children when using any device over the internet. We know that the online world can add great value to the lives of children and young people, personally and/or educationally.

Many adults believe that young people know more about technology than them, however, its proper usage requires wisdom, positive personal values, emotional intelligence and self-reflection, and this is where adults must take the lead.

Types of risks/harm

- Grooming: through social media and/or gaming etc., in order to exploit children/young people, be that for radicalisation, sexual abuse, or criminal activity.
- Cyberbullying
- Sexual abuse: including non-contact activities, such as involving children in looking at, or in the production of, sexual images, watching sexual activities, and encouraging children to behave in sexually inappropriate ways.
- Financial: i.e. online gambling, in-game spending, scams.
- Exposure to inappropriate materials: e.g., pro-suicide/anorexia/self-harm sites, various forms of hatred, violent, frightening or pornographic media.
- Obsessive use of the internet e.g addiction to video games, social media self-image and number of likes.
- Other inappropriate or illegal behaviour: for example, exposure to/creation of hate mail, or offensive images, game hacking, device crashing, stalking, harassment, videoing/livestreaming assaults.

Spot the signs:

- spending much more or much less time than usual online, texting, gaming or using social media.
- uploading personal information, theirs or others;
- appearing withdrawn, upset or outraged after using the internet or texting;
- being secretive about who they are talking to and what they are doing online or on their mobile phone;
- having lots of new phone numbers, texts or e-mail addresses on their mobile phone, laptop or tablet;
- suddenly possessing unexplained money/gifts/expensive in-game purchases;
- talking about destroying someone's online game;
- signs and indicators of any offline forms of abuse/criminal activity;
- young children talking about/enacting things they would ordinarily have no knowledge or comprehension of.

What to do:
